

Excelsior Multi-Manager Oasis Portfolio

As at 28 February 2010



Portfolio objective

The local component of the assets in this portfolio is managed by Oasis Asset Management Limited (Oasis) and the global component by Investment Solutions in its Global Balanced Portfolio. Oasis is a Deep-Value manager whose objective is superior returns at below-market risk. To achieve this objective, the company seeks to identify shares with an undervalued stream of sustainable cash flow. Once in-depth fundamental research confirms a share offers value, it is added to their portfolios. The size of the investment, however, depends on liquidity and risk factors. Deep Value managers such as Oasis are not at all benchmark cognisant regarding portfolio construction.

Quarterly commentary (4th quarter)

Oasis underperformed its benchmark for the quarter, which led to it being the worst-performing manager in the Alexander Forbes SA LMW survey. This stemmed mainly from the equity component.

At an asset-allocation level, the net effect was positive, driven by the portfolio being overweight equities and underweight cash. The manager is looking to reduce equities, believing them to be fairly priced, and will continue to increase bond exposure. Its underweight to bonds also added value. Oasis's performance was largely driven by poor selection of equity shares, specifically being underweight Anglos within Basic Materials. Resources were supported by strong foreign interest. This led to anomalous behaviour by this sector because foreign interest was a significant factor in strengthening the rand and also Resources. A strong rand usually results in a weaker performance by the sector. Foreign interest in Resources was a result of the recovery in the global economy led by emerging markets. Stronger emerging market growth implies higher commodity prices and SA's attractiveness is consequently its Resource sector. Poor share selection within Industrials (specifically a zero weighting to Bidvest) and Consumer Goods (specifically an overweight to Rainbow Chickens and Astral Foods) contributed negatively. From the second quarter of 2009, the SA equity markets moved up in tandem with the global equity markets. However, a lag experienced by the domestic economy relative to its global counterpart resulted in a sluggish recovery for SA Inc.

Oasis was overweight SA Inc shares such as Rainbow Chicken, Omnia Holdings and Nampak, which detracted value.

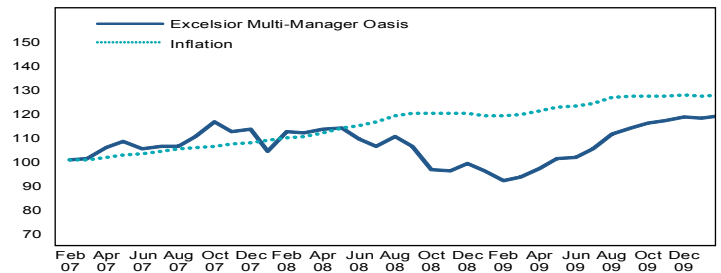
As from 28th October 2008 the portfolio's foreign investment exposure might exceed the restrictive limit of 20%, or as amended from time to time, as a result of the inward listed British American Tobacco ("BAT") shares received as part of a corporate de-merger. The South African Reserve Bank has allowed some institutional investors a grace period of 2 years to rebalance their portfolios to adhere to the foreign investment limit. 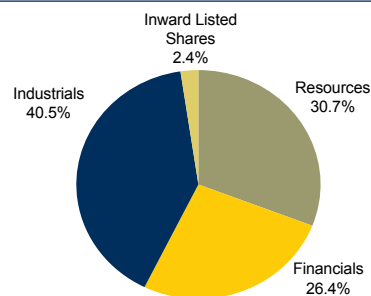
