- wants exposure to non South African assets and to currencies other than the Rand

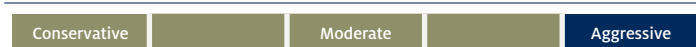
For the Dollar investor who:

- is prepared to accept some fluctuations in returns from year to year

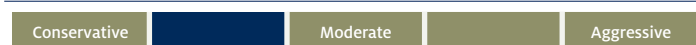
For the Rand investor who:

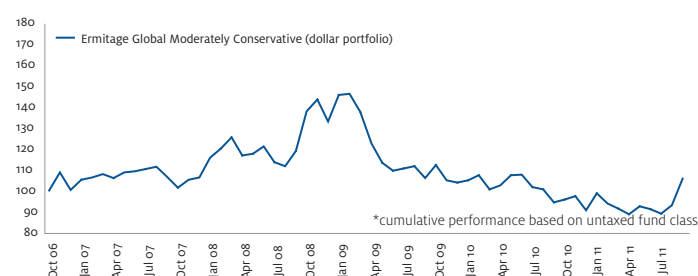
Quarterly commentary (2nd quarter)

December was another good month for many of our portfolios, despite the turbulence in most bonds markets. Having seen a similar profile of positive returns in November when both bonds and equities sold off, we are pleased to see the consistency of return whereby we made money with equities and bonds moving in opposite directions.

As absolute return investors, the above scenario of widely divergent outcomes in the underlying markets continues to suggest that for most products (i.e., other than those with a specific directional mandate), we should avoid taking large outright directional positions in markets. Instead we should look for asset classes and geographies that offer us the best opportunity to make money from inefficiencies, anomalies, and mis-pricings rather than outright directional beta. As a result, across our products we have an overarching theme in preferring nimble trading managers that can reposition to differing market conditions as they find themselves.

From a strategy perspective, as previously mentioned, we have adjusted our model portfolios to increase our allocation to emerging markets (but only to managers that we believe can trade opportunistically, and we have avoided pure beta players), and commodities where we see ongoing opportunities (similarly, our commodity managers have proven their ability to make money in down as well as up months for the underlying)

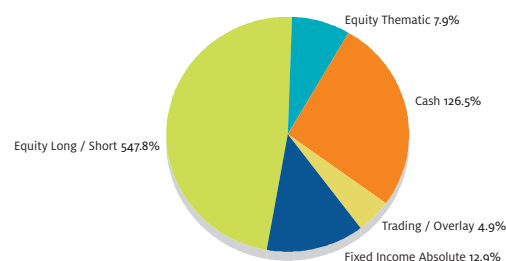

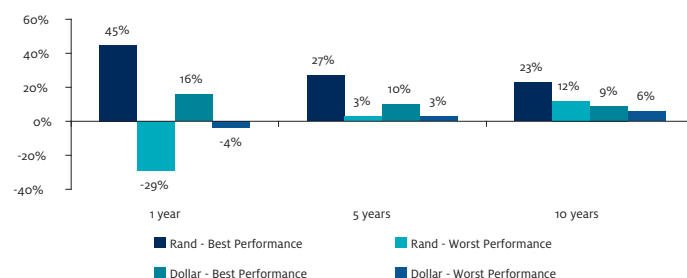
Strategy allocation

Return volatility
